Adverb Phrases

An adverb phrase is a prep phrase that modifies a verb, adjective, or other adverb. It answers the question when, where, how/in what manner, or to what extent.

Bring the book here.

The class began early.

Adverb Phrases

Bring the book to my desk.

The class began at 7 am.

Adverb phrases modifying verbs:

Raindrops fell in heavy torrents.

Feil how? In heavy torrents

We traveled to Florida.

Traveled where? To Florida

Adverb phrases modifying adjectives:

The day was warm for December.

The movie was funny for a thriller.

Warm when? For December Funny how? For a thriller

Adverb	phrases	modifying	adverbs:

The class ended suddenly in minutes.

Suddenly when? In minutes

The students did file quickly down the hall.

Quickly where? Down the hall

Other important points:

Adverb phrases, unlike adjective phrases, are not always located near the words they modify in a sentence.

when During class, Mrs. Adams did give notes.

After lunch, the students went home.

Two or more adverb phrases can also be located in different parts of the sentence and still modify the same word.

When In an instant, a tornado tore through the field. Whene

At recess, kids played on the monkey bars. What?

List of Common Helping Verbs

am, are, is, was, were, be, being, been have, has, had shall, will do, does, did may, must, might can, could, would, should

Keep in mind that there can be more than one word making up one helping verb. There are many combos, like am being, shall have been, could be, etc.
