Adverbiel Phreses

An adverbial phrase is a group of words that act together as an adverb, giving more information about a verb, adjective, or other adverb in a sentence. The adverbial phrase answers the same questions as a regular adverb: how/how much, when, or where.

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Prepositional Phrases (Adverb) • Practice 1

Phrases That Act as Adverbs An adverb phrase is a prepositional phrase that modifies a verb, adjective, or adverb. Adverb phrases point out where, in what manner, or to what extent.

Adverbs	Adverb Phrases
He painted the boat carefully.	He painted the boat with care. (Painted in what manner?)
Leave the radio there.	Leave the radio in your room. (Leave Where?)

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Adverb Prepositional Phrases

Like a one-word adverb, an adverb prepositional phrase usually modifies a verb and may tell *where*, *how*, or *when* an action takes place.

We play ball in the park. (Tells where we play)

She called in a loud voice. (Tells how she called)

Mom gave us smiles throughout the day. (Tells when Mom gave)

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Adjective and Adverb Phrases A

5c. A prepositional phrase that modifies a noun or a pronoun is called an *adjective phrase*.

An adjective phrase tells what kind or which one.

EXAMPLE What do you think influences the changes in hairstyles? [The adjective phrase modifies the noun *changes*, telling *what kind*.]

5d. A prepositional phrase that modifies a verb, an adjective, or an adverb is called an *adverb phrase*.

An adverb phrase tells how, when, where, why, or to what extent.

EXAMPLE Why do you think some hairstyles remain popular for only a short time? [The adverb phrase modifies the adjective *popular*, telling to what extent.]
