## Author's Point of View

When writing, authors must decide from what point of view they want to express their ideas. There are three different choices – first person, second person, and a variety of third person point of views. The type of pronouns and the genre can be a clue when identifying the author's point of view.

FIRST PERSON		
Definition	Clues	
A character within the story recounts/retells his or her own experiences or impressions.	<ul> <li>Lets the reader know only what that character knows.</li> <li>Uses the pronouns <i>I</i>, <i>me</i>, <i>my</i>, <i>mine</i>, <i>we</i>, <i>our</i>, <i>ours</i>.</li> </ul>	

SECOND PERSON		
Definition	Clues	
The story or the piece of writing is from the perspective of "you."	<ul> <li>Uncommon form of writing.</li> <li>Used mainly with instruction manuals, recipes, giving directions, and poetry.</li> <li>Uses the pronouns <i>you</i>, <i>yours</i>.</li> </ul>	

THIRD PERSON OBJECTIVE		
Definition	Clues	
The narrator remains a detached observer, telling only the story, action, and dialogue.	<ul> <li>Lets the reader know only what is seen and heard, not what characters think or feel.</li> <li>Uses the pronouns <i>he</i>, <i>she</i>, <i>it</i>, <i>they</i>.</li> </ul>	

THIRD PERSON LIMITED		
Definition	Clues	
The narrator tells the story from the viewpoint of one character in the story.	<ul> <li>Lets the reader know what one character thinks, sees, knows, hears, and feels.</li> <li>Uses the pronouns <i>he, she, it, they</i>.</li> </ul>	

THIRD PERSON OMNISCIENT		
Definition	Clues	
The narrator has unlimited knowledge and can describe every character's thoughts and interpret their behaviors.	<ul> <li>Lets the reader know unlimited information about the characters.</li> <li>Uses the pronouns <i>he, she, it, they</i>.</li> </ul>
